The Knowledge Area

As mentioned by OECD (1997) "the knowledge economy depends as much on the knowledge distribution power of the system as on its knowledge production power. This openness to knowledge will provide the impetus for the accelerated growth of knowledge societies".(Raju, 2013)

"Openness means unhindered access to information and knowledge. The free flow of information is a major component to bridging the knowledge gaps between privileged and under-privileged communities". (Raju, 2013)

The Open Access (OA) era in EU: Initiative

Based on Budapest OA Initiative (BOAI, 2002):

"OA is the free availability of information resource on the public internet, permitting any users to read, download, copy, distribute, print, search or link to the full texts of these articles, crawl them for indexing, pass them as data to software, or use them for any other lawful purpose, without financial, legal or technical barriers other than those inseparable from gaining access to the internet itself. The only constraint on reproduction and distribution, and the only role for copyright in this domain, should be to give authors control over the integrity of their work and the right to be properly knowledged and cited"

The Open Access (OA) era: In few words

- ➤OA = online access at no charge to the user to peer-reviewed scientific publications to research data
- For publications: OA comes after a decision to publish
- >OA does not interfere with patenting

The Publication Era: Journals and Libraries through Time

Before E-journals	E-journals	Open Access Journals
- Collections of paper journals	- A massive collection of e- journals	- Free access for all users
- slower research cycle	- Simplification of the research process (literature immediately available)	- Social responsible behaviour (free access to all)
- The bound volumes of newspapers in stacks	- Easy and quickly accessibility	- Increases citations of publications
- The library pays subscriptions	- The library pays a subscription (consortia)	- Enhances the visibility of scientific work
- Awareness of new e- resources	Problems: - stagnation of library budgets - management of collection of newspapers losing its importance	Problems: - Financing of publication in the open access (APC)

Open Access Types:

GOLD

- published originally as OA
 - journals, monographs (full peer review, "pure OA")
 - megajournals (modified peer review, "pure OA")
 - articles (full peer review, "hybrid OA")
- published originally via toll access, OA via rolling wall
- 3% of physics/astronomy to high 13% medicine (Björk 2009)
- annual growth rate est. at 20% (Springer; Laakso et al 2011)
- 60% of all peer reviewed journals by 2025


GREEN

- Pre-print or post-print (permission)
- 6% of biochemistry/microbiology to high 30% earth sci (Björk 2009)

OTHER

- faculty websites, open digital collections, datasets
- no estimates on scale

4. Vision, objectives and benefits of the Policy for Open Access to Scientific Information

The vision of the national policy for Open Access is the creation of open access conditions - for all the citizens, researchers and businesses - to the publications of research organizations and academic institutions in Cyprus, that are publicly or privately funded.

The objective of the Open Access Policy is the alignment with European policies (European Commission recommendation, Horizon 2020) and current best practices, effectively participating in the formulation of a research and academic ecosystem, in the framework of which, access to research and especially publicly funded research is immediate and open. This is based on the recognition of knowledge as a public good which brings social and economic benefits at national, European and international level.



National OA Policy 2/2

More specifically, the expected benefits for the society, but also for the researchers, are of major importance and are described as follows:

- The total of the scientific work which is foremost publicly, but also privately funded, is concentrated, safeguarded in the long-run and becomes available to the citizens, while at the same time, it becomes internationally available through accessible repositories.
- Publicly funded research projects can be indexed and traced by the internet search engines.
- The traffic and use of the publications can be monitored, while data and indicators for the evolution of research are collected.
- The internal and external evaluation of research stakeholders is facilitated, and so is the dissemination of their scientific production.
- Possibilities for exploitation and reuse of projects for scientific purposes are generated (CV's, publications, reports on excellence, debriefing reports, indicators, websites of research institutions, personal websites etc.).
- The channels for international cooperation are enhanced, as well as the international profile of researchers, research institutions and of the country in general.
- The visibility of the researchers' work is enhanced, receiving therefore more references and citations
- The impact of the researchers' work is increased.
- Researchers acquire a permanent internet link for each of their projects.


